!!!POPE FRANCIS AND HALLOWEEN!!!

VATICAN CITY — As millions of revelers around the world dress in ghoulish costumes to mark Halloween and the darker side of life, Pope Francis warned that the devil is no myth and must be fought strenuously with "God's armor." Francis described Christian life as a continuous battle against Satan during his homily at morning Mass at the Vatican on Thursday.

"This generation, and many others, have been led to believe that the devil is a myth, a figure, an idea, the idea of evil," the pope told the faithful during Mass at the St. Martha guesthouse where he lives inside the walls of the Vatican. "But the devil exists and we must fight against him."

Basing his reflections on the Apostle Paul's admonition that Christians must "put on the full armor of God" in order to resist Satan's temptations, Francis likened life to a "military endeavor" and urged people against being carried away by passions and temptations. "No spiritual life, no Christian life is possible without resisting temptations, without putting on God's armor which gives us strength and protects us. ... The truth is God's armor."

Meanwhile, an Italian exorcist, the Rev. Aldo Buonaiuto, suggested that Halloween should be replaced by a celebration of Christian saints and renamed "Holyween." He said too many people wrongly believe Halloween is a "simple carnival"; instead, he said, it masks "a subterranean world" based on the occult. "For followers of the occult, Oct. 31 is the satanic new year," he told the Italian daily *La Nazione*. "It's a time for attracting new converts. And it's also a time when exorcists have to work more. Buonaiuto is director of the Pope John XXIII Community Association, a Catholic organization fighting black magic sects and satanic cults, and is involved in Catholic training programs for exorcists.

With Halloween, he said, there is an increase in black magic rites, cemetery desecrations, thefts of sacred bones and the adoration of Satan, as well as demonic possessions.

FROM FR. SLAWEK...

Feast of All Saints – November 1

Since the early centuries, the Church has reserved one day to remember, collectively, all the saints, both those officially named as well as the vast number – surely the greater part – known only to God.

The official process of canonization involves a prolonged investigation that can take centuries to complete. The formality of this process, the emphasis on certified miracles, and the fact that those officially named are invariably exceptional figures, can serve to emphasize the gap between "real saints" and "people like us". In that sense, the process can hinder, rather than help us realize a crucial fact: that all Christians, not just a select few, are called to holiness.

That doesn't mean we should aspire to canonization. It simply reflects the fact that in calling ourselves followers of Christ we have pledged to conform our hearts and minds to the pattern of his holiness. This holiness is not necessarily expressed in writing learned tomes, performing fantastic feats of asceticism, founding religious congregation, or performing miracles. If we want to see the face of holiness we can recognize it in the qualities Jesus enumerates in the Beatitudes: Blessed are the poor in spirit... the meek... the merciful... the peacemakers... the pure of heart.

In this litany Jesus summarizes the virtues and attitudes implied by faithful discipleship. It is good to recall that these blessing are not directed to abstract qualities (poverty of spirit, meekness, purity of heart) but to the people who embody them, doubtless fully human, with all the faults and weaknesses that implies. Though these "blessings" do not exactly describe the traditional criteria for sanctity, we know that when we stand in the presence of such people or read their stories we feel closer to Jesus, with a renewed sense of possibility. Such was the experience of Ignatius Loyola, while recovering from war wounds, when he read a book of lives of the saints. He found himself excited by the thought, "What if I should do what St. Francis did, what St. Dominic did?"

It is easy to think of holy people from our time who embody these qualities: Mother Teresa (the merciful), Dorothy Day (the peacemaker), Oscar Romero (hungering and thirsting for righteousness). But it is also possible to recognize people of our own acquaintance who embody these qualities. It may be someone who stands out for her gentleness or forgiveness, someone who retains a spirit of joy in the midst of sorrows, someone who risks disapproval or looking foolish for taking an unpopular stand, someone who we always count on to provide an example that is loving, brave, and true. Such people also represent the face of holiness in our time. It is not

likely they will be canonized. Churches will not be named in their honor. And yet they too may be counted among the great "cloud of witnesses" recognized on the feast of All Saints.

FROM FR. JAVIER...

TEACHING FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

The Fourth Commandment

Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land which the Lord your God gives you.

The catechism of the Catholic Church in the numeral 2197 teaches us about his commandment: "The fourth commandment opens the second table of the Decalogue. It shows us the order of charity. God has willed that, after him, we should honor our parents to whom we owe life and who have handed on to us the knowledge of God. We are obliged to honor and respect all those whom God, for our good, has vested with his authority".

This commandment is expressed in positive terms of duties to be fulfilled. It introduces the subsequent commandments which are concerned with particular respect for life, marriage, earthly goods, and speech. It constitutes one of the foundations of the social doctrine of the Church.

The fourth commandment is addressed expressly to children in their relationship to their father and mother, because this relationship is the most universal. It likewise concerns the ties of kinship between members of the extended family. It requires honor, affection, and gratitude toward elders and ancestors. Finally, it extends to the duties of pupils to teachers, employees to employers, subordinates to leaders, citizens to their country, and to those who administer or govern it. This commandment includes and presupposes the duties of parents, instructors, teachers, leaders, magistrates, those who govern, all who exercise authority over others or over a community of persons.

As well in the numeral 2200 from the catechism said: "Observing the fourth commandment brings its reward: *"Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land which the LORD your God gives you."* Respecting this commandment provides, along with spiritual fruits, temporal fruits of peace and prosperity. Conversely, failure to observe it brings great harm to communities and to individuals". *Respect and love ours progenitors.*
