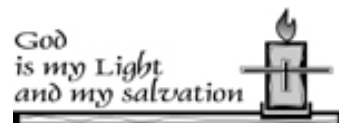

WHERE DO YOU FIND GOD THIS WEEK?

Today's story of Abram (at one point to become Abraham) Abram finds God in a smoking fire pot and flaming torch that passes between the remains of the animal sacrifice he made hours before. Abram was patient, he waited for God to act. Abram saw the power and strength of God in the fire. He put his faith in God's words that a covenant of trust and love was established between them. God would care for his people. He would endow them with blessings and always be their God. In return they were to be his people who followed no other gods.

On the mountain with Jesus, Peter, James and John, witness a transformation in Jesus' appearance as he is transfigured into his glorified self as God - the same God who appeared to Abram and Moses and Elijah the great prophet. They hear a voice from the heavens and Peter realizes he was in the presence of God as no other had ever been.

So the question - Where did God appear to you this week? None of us had the dramatic appearances of God like Abram and the Apostles but wasn't God showing his glory, his care, his love to you this week. Did you see happiness in a little child? Did you see someone showing care and generosity to someone else? Did you experience the closeness and support of someone you love? Did you not see God as others revealed him to you?

So a further question - How did you show others the presence of God? Or did you? Like Jesus who revealed the Glory of God to his disciples so they would believe in him, we too, as disciples, are to reveal the presence of God to others. We do this through our actions. When we can see Jesus in each person we encounter no matter who they are or their status we are in contact with God. It is easy to do this with those we love, but what about the homeless person you might encounter? What about the refugees seeking a home safe from violence and war- are we welcoming them as Jesus would do? Revealing God might mean we have to change not our appearance but our attitudes and instead of thinking me first begin to think first of the needs of the others. Revealing God might mean that we have to take risks to stand up for what we believe as Catholic Christians in matters of life, poverty, hunger and violence. Revealing God to others challenges us not only to acknowledge the difficulties that we face in the community and in the world but to be active in doing our part to bring the presence of God's love to all these situations. Maybe you think I can't do that. Maybe Abram and Peter and the others felt the same way but it was the power of God's love and mercy that transformed them and brought them out of themselves to become witnesses for the powerful presence of God among us...ask God to be present to you with his powerful love and great mercy...you might be surprised the effect it will have on you...Fr Joe

A THOUGHT FOR A LENTEN DAY: "A rich person is not one who has the most, but is the one who needs the least." A lesser known saint is St. Gilbert 1083-1189 the son of a Norman knight who lived in England during the *middle ages*. He became a priest and founder of the order called the Gilbertines. Over the years a special custom grew up in the houses of the order called "the plate of the Lord Jesus." The best portions of the dinner were put on a special plate and shared with the poor, reflecting Gilbert's lifelong concern for less fortunate people. Unfortunately the order came to an end when King Henry VIII suppressed all Catholic monasteries. What do we do with our best portions? How is your Rice Bowl doing? Are you giving money to help feed the hungry?

CATHOLIC CHARITIES...You Did It for Me

82-year-old Ida* came to the U.S. in 1989 on a VISA status. She worked as a housekeeper for three decades. Years ago a lawyer told Ida that he could help her gain citizenship. He charged \$2500. Ida paid, but she never heard from the lawyer again. Ida was afraid of being deported. One Sunday, Ida read in a church bulletin that Catholic Charities had an immigration services office. She made an appointment. The case manager explained everything and walked Ida through the whole citizenship application process. Today she is a citizen.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE SCRIPTURES

2nd Sunday of Lent

...in accordance with the scriptures ... He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Luke 24:44

The Messiah Will Be Betrayed By One Of His Followers...

The Prophecy - Psalm 41:10, 55:13-15 Even my trusted friend, who ate my bread, has raised his heel against me. For it is not an enemy that reviled me—that I could bear—not a foe who viewed me with contempt, from that I could hide. But it was you, my other self, my comrade and friend, you, whose company I enjoyed, at whose side I walked in the house of God.

The Fulfillment - Matthew 26: 47-50...While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, arrived, accompanied by a large crowd, with swords and clubs, who had come from the chief priests and the elders of the people. His betrayer had arranged a sign with them,

saying, "The man I shall kiss is the one; arrest him." Immediately he went over to Jesus and said, "Hail, Rabbi!" and he kissed him. Jesus answered him, "Friend, do what you have come for." Then stepping forward they laid hands on Jesus and arrested him.

About the Prophecy - Psalm 41 is a psalm of David. He speaks of his own isolation and his trust in God. He describes how the sharing of food unites people in loyalty and friendship. Psalm 55 is a psalm of David as well. In this psalm, he outlines the betrayal of a trusted friend, who was seemingly a follower of God. Both of these psalms prophesy the betrayal of Jesus by a close and trusted friend.

WHY WE ARE CATHOLIC...All Christ's riches "are for every individual and are everybody's property." Christ did not live his life for himself but for us, from his Incarnation "for us men and for our salvation" to his death "for our sins" and Resurrection "for our justification." He is still "our advocate with the Father," who "always lives to make intercession" for us. He remains ever "in the presence of God on our behalf, bringing before him all that he lived and suffered for us." - The Catechism of the Catholic Church paragraph #519.
