**SOME THOUGHTS ON THE POLITICAL PROCESS...** Quotes from the United States Bishops’ document “Faithful citizenship” - This document was written in 2000 and it serves as a guide for Catholics in learn more about the issues that we are asked to make choices on in each election.

**HOW DOES THE CHURCH HELP THE CATHOLICS SPEAK ABOUT POLITICAL AND SOCIAL QUESTIONS:** --- “In forming our consciences is the critical first step. Prudence come by praying for the gift of prudence which enables us to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it. Prudence shapes and informs our ability to deliberate over available alternatives and to determine what is most fitting to a specific context and to act.

A basic moral principle in all things is: *Do good and avoid evil.* Here are some issues that the Bishops urge Catholics to be informed on as they prepare to vote: Human Life deserves respect and dignity from the time of conception to the time of natural death. There is no great responsibility we have than to honor, respect and preserve the gift of human life of each person.

The protection of marriage as a lifelong and faithful union of man and woman as the central institutions of society --- The achievement of a comprehensive immigration reform that respects the rule of law and addressed the factors that compel people to leave their own countries. --- Helping families overcome poverty and ensure access to and choice in education. ---Ensure full conscience protection and religious freedom for all individuals and groups. --- Providing health care and religious freedom in our health care system. ---*Continue to oppose policies* that reflect racism, hostility towards immigrants, religious bigotry and other forms of unjust discrimination. Seeking responsible an effective response for ending the persecution of Christians and other religious minorities in the Middle East and other parts of the world.

### WHY WE ARE CATHOLIC...

We are Catholic because we believe: Death puts an end to human life as the time open to either accepting or rejecting the divine grace manifested in Christ. The New Testament speaks of judgment primarily in its aspect of the final encounter with Christ in his second coming, but also repeatedly affirms that each will be rewarded immediately after death in accordance with his works and faith. The parable of the poor man Lazarus and the words of Christ on the cross to the good thief, as well as other New Testament texts speak of a final destiny of the soul—a destiny which can be different for some and for others. ### THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### First Reading: Wisdom 11:22—12:2

In this reading, we are reminded of the love God feels toward every creature, or else he would not have created them. God shows mercy on our sins and hopes we will repent and have faith in him.

#### Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 1:11—2:2

Paul tells the Thessalonians that God will make them worthy of his call, so that they can be glorified in Christ. Paul also tells them he is unsure when Christ will come again, but urges them not to believe people who falsely state that Jesus has returned.

#### Gospel: Luke 19:1-10

Zacchaeus, the wealthy chief tax collector in Jericho, was very excited when Jesus came to town and asked to stay with him. People were angry that Jesus would go to a sinner's home. Zacchaeus then told Jesus he planned to give half of his belongings to the poor, and repay any person he had cheated. Jesus was delighted since his mission was "to search out and save what was lost."
