FROM FR. MARCIN...

My dear parishioners,

Today we celebrate the 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time. It is the last Sunday before we begin the Holy Season of Lent our preparation to celebrate Jesus passion, death and glorious resurrection.

February 14th is known as Valentine's Day but what is more important for us this year it is ASH WEDNESDAY - Day of fasting and abstinence, the first day of Lenten season.

In today's Gospel that poor leper had two sufferings to carry; not only was he suffering from illness but he was also cut off from the community. Lepers had to live outside the village or town in a sort of leper colony because of the contagious nature of the disease. When people were nearby lepers would say, "Unclean, unclean." The leper shouldn't even have been in the village that day when Jesus came. Even when he approached the leper Jesus kept his distance. Jesus had to stretch out his hand to touch him when curing him. When Jesus healed the leper, Jesus not only healed his illness but

restored him to his community and family once again.

We are meant for community, we are not meant for isolation. We have been created for community and are called to live our faith in and with a community. Isolation and independence is a contradiction to Christianity. Every Sunday when we celebrate the Eucharist we celebrate as a community. In community we are to make Christ real. Love is to be the characteristic of the Christian community. When we gather for the Eucharist it is to be an act of love, reflecting the love in the community, because everyone in the community is to reflect Christ. If we gather for the Eucharist but do not love each other, our Eucharist is a sham. Jesus healed the leprous man and restored him to community. We have been created for community and are called to live our faith in and with a community. "We though many form one single body," and "by this will all know that you are my disciples, if you have love one for another."

ASH WEDNESDAY AND HOLY SEASON OF LENT.

Lent is a favorable season for opening the doors to all those in need and recognizing in them the face of Christ."-- Pope Francis

Ash Wednesday is one of the most popular and important holy days in the liturgical calendar. Ash Wednesday opens Lent, a season of fasting and prayer. Ash Wednesday comes from the ancient Jewish tradition of penance and fasting. The practice includes the wearing of ashes on the head. The ashes symbolize the dust from which God made us.



During Lent, we are asked to devote ourselves to seeking the Lord in prayer and reading Scripture, to service by giving alms, and to sacrifice self-control through fasting.

Here are the church regulations for fasting and abstinence during Lent:

- -Everyone 14 years of age or older is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.
- -Everyone 18 or older, and under 59 years of age, is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- -On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- -Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed minimal penitential practices.

- -Stations of the Cross Traditional Lenten Devotion Every Friday - at **OLM** after morning mass, and 7:30pm and every Monday at our church **St. Mark's** at 7pm.
- -Every Monday Sacrament of Penance will be celebrated in our church and every church in our diocese from 7pm to 8:30 during this time the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament will be held as well.

- Lenten reflection with Fr. Marcin (Every Tuesday night during **Lent at OLM PARISH CENTER)**

First session – February 13 – 7PM

FROM FR. SLAWOMIR...

Saints Cyril and Methodius - February 13

Apostles to the Slavs (d. 869, 855)

Cyril and Methodius were brothers born in Tessalonica in the early ninth century. Cyril, the younger, studied philosophy at the imperial university in Constantinople, where he was ordained a priest. His older brother Methodius remained a monk in Greece. Both had participated in cultural and diplomatic missions among the Slavs and had some knowledge of their language. When, therefore, the emperor received a request for Christian missionaries from the ruler of Moravia, he commissioned the two Greek brothers. They set off in

Though German missionaries had been operating in the East for some while, they were hampered by their refusal to instruct the people in any language but Latin. Cyril and Methodius, in contrast, preached in the vernacular. What is more, they invented a Slavonic alphabet into

which they translated the Scriptures, with the result that they are remembered among other things as founders of Slavonic literature. They also introduced the Slavonic language into the liturgy (to this day the official liturgical language of many churches of the East). Though their innovations led to conflict with the German bishops, their mission was a huge success. They are honored in the calendars of both the East and the West, remembered not only as apostles to the Slavic peoples but as innovative missionaries and pioneers of inculturation.

"They desired to become similar in every aspect to those to whom they were bringing the Gospel; they wished to become part of those people and to share their lot in everything."

TEACHING FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC

CHURCH - THE TEN COMMANDMENTS The Sixth Commandment

You shall not commit adultery. "You have heard that it was said, You shall not commit adultery. But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart".


My dear brothers and sisters the catechism of the Catholic Church in the numeral 2361 says that "Sexuality, by means of which man and woman give themselves to one another through the acts which are proper and exclusive to spouses, is not something simply biological, but concerns the innermost being of the human person as such. It is realized in a truly human way only if it is an integral part of the love by which a man and woman commit themselves totally to one another until death".

The spouses' union achieves the twofold end of marriage: the good of the spouses themselves and the transmission of life. These two meanings or values of marriage cannot be separated without altering the couple's spiritual life and compromising the goods of marriage and the future of the family.

The married couple forms "the intimate partnership of life and love established by the Creator and governed by his laws; it is rooted in the conjugal covenant, that is, in their irrevocable personal consent." Both give themselves definitively and totally to one another. They are no longer two; from now on they form one flesh. The covenant they freely contracted imposes on the spouses the obligation to preserve it as unique and indissoluble. "What therefore God has joined together, let not man put asunder".

Fidelity expresses constancy in keeping one's given word. God is faithful. The Sacrament of Matrimony enables man and woman to enter into Christ's fidelity for his Church. Through conjugal chastity, they bear witness to this mystery before the world.
