My dear parishioners,



Today we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday, the feast of Divine Mercy. St. Mary Faustina Kowalska was privileged to receive apparitions from Jesus emphasizing his mercy, and especially his mercy today. Jesus promised that those who go to Confession and receive Holy Communion today will receive not only forgiveness of their sins, but the total remission of all temporal punishment for their sins. It is like a second baptism, all sin and punishment is wiped out.

In the year 2000, the Second Sunday of Easter occurred on April 30th. On that day, the Holy Father, St. John Paul II, canonized Sr. Mary Faustina Kowalska. St. Faustina was only 33 years old when she died in 1938. She spent most of her life in convents in Poland. Yet her life has made an impact upon the entire world.

St. John Paul II said in his canonization homily that St. Faustina was told that the two rays coming from Jesus' heart represented blood and water. Blood referred to the sacrifice of the cross, and the gift of the Eucharist. Water referred to the gifts of baptism and the Holy Spirit. Jesus told her, "My daughter, tell people that I am love and mercy personified." St. John Paul II said that this was a needed message for the people who had witnessed the sufferings of millions during the last century.

Jesus Christ is the source of our peace. He is love. He is mercy. We go before Him in the face of the horrible attacks of evil upon the world and say to Him, "I trust in you." We go before Him recognizing our own sinfulness and say to Him, "I trust in you."

There are hundreds of thousands, if not millions still suffering the attacks of others. We recognize their pain and we call upon Jesus who is Love and Mercy and say, "I trust in you." There are many who have committed the most unspeakable sins, particularly sins against life who need to bring their sinfulness before the Lord and say, "Jesus, I trust in you." We need to bring our own sins before the Lord and say, "Jesus I trust in you."

St. John Paul II concluded the canonization homily by saying: "And you, Faustina, a gift of God to our time, a gift from the land of Poland to the whole Church, obtain for us an awareness of the depth of divine mercy; help us to have a living experience of it and to bear witness to it among our brothers and sisters.

God is like a father who comes out of the house to welcome us back his sons and daughters. Today God has thrown a party during which we can receive God's infinite mercy. Let us go to the party and receive God's mercy.

A number of times in St. Faustina's diary we see the power of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Jesus said it is a very powerful prayer at the time of death and at the bedside of a dying person. The souls that say this chaplet will be embraced by my mercy during their lifetime and especially at the hour of their death.

Ponder, today, the image of The Divine Mercy. Ponder, especially, the fact that no image will even come close to expressing the full

depth of love pouring forth from the Heart of our Savior. Grow in a desire for that Mercy as you ponder this sacred image.

Lord, You have poured out upon the world Your infinite Mercy coming forth from Your divine Heart. May I bask in that Mercy now and always. Jesus, I trust in You

To celebrate properly the Feast of Divine Mercy and receive the forgiveness of all sins and punishment,

You must go to Confession to a Catholic priest within 20 days before or after Divine Mercy Sunday. If you are in the state of very serious or mortal sin, you must confess them before receiving Holy Communion or you will also commit a sacrilege which is a very serious sin. If you haven't been going to Sunday Mass without any good reason, you may be in a state of serious sin and you must confess before receiving Jesus in Communion.

FROM FR. SLAWOMIR...

St. Stanislaus – April 11

Bishop and Martyr (1030-1079)

The role of the Polish Church in hastening the downfall of communism has been widely told. But in their stand against tyranny and injustice, the recent generation of Polish Catholics upheld an ancient tradition. One of the most revered saints in Poland is St. Stanislaus, a bishop of Cracow, who died as a martyr in the eleventh century.

Among the Polish bishop of his day, Stanislaus was the only one with the courage to stand up to the tyrannical king Boleslaus II and to denounce his cruelty and abuse of power. The last straw came when Boleslaus abducted the beautiful wife of one of his noblemen and carried her away to his castle. Upon hearing of this outrage, Stanislaus went to rebuke the king and to threaten him with excommunication if he did not amend his ways. When all other methods of persuasion failed, Stanislaus carried through on his threat.

Thus, when Boleslaus and his retinue arrived at the cathedral for Mass, he was turned away at the door.

Enraged, Boleslaus ordered his guard to kill the bishop. When they balked at his command, Boleslaus drew his own sword and performed the bloody deed himself. Stanislaus was immediately acclaimed as a martyr. Pope Gregory VII put the country under an interdict, which endured until the death of the unrepentant Boleslaus. St. Stanislaus was canonized in 1253.

FROM FR. JAVIER...

TEACHING FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH - THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

The Seventh Commandment

You shall not steal.

My brothers and sisters, the seventh commandment talks about the Love for the Poor too. *"God blesses those who come to the aid of the poor and rebukes those who turn away from them: Give to him who begs from you, do not refuse him who would borrow from you; you received without pay, give without pay. It is by what they have done for the poor that Jesus Christ will recognize his chosen ones. When the poor have the good news preached to them, it is the sign of Christ's presence".*

"The Church's love for the poor . . . is a part of her constant tradition." This love is inspired by the Gospel of the Beatitudes, of the poverty of Jesus, and of his concern for the poor. Love for the poor is even one of the motives for the duty of working so as to be able to give to those in need. It extends not only to material poverty but also to the many forms of cultural and religious poverty.

St. John Chrysostom vigorously recalls this: *"Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs. The demands of justice must be satisfied first of all; that which is already due in justice is not to be offered as a gift of charity":*

When we attend to the needs of those in want, we give them what is theirs, not ours. More than performing works of mercy, we are paying a debt of justice.

Also the works of mercy are charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbor in his spiritual and bodily necessities. Instructing, advising, consoling, comforting are spiritual works of mercy, as are forgiving and bearing wrongs patiently. the corporal works of mercy consist especially in feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and burying the dead. Among all these, giving alms to the poor is one of the chief witnesses to fraternal charity: it is also a work of justice pleasing to God. God bless you.
